English	Reading:         This term in reading, the children will be focussing the Reading Gems of Comparing, Summarising and Sequencing.		
	We will be looking at a variety of different texts, from poetry to non-fiction texts, which we will use to compare and contrast features. As we have progressed through the year, we moved onto longer texts which give us the opportunity to try summarising whole stories and sequencing events.		
	<u>Writing</u> : Our first writing project is going to be writing an information text about sea creatures. This project will be used to write a piece of non-fiction text and use a range of different subordinating conjunctions like 'if' and 'that'. Then we will be writing a piece of fiction based on our own magical creatures. Writing our own stories will provide an opportunity to create settings, characters and plots.

	<b>SPAG:</b> Throughout the term, we are going to be working on our key grammar areas, including spelling rules, punctuation and word classes. We are going to start the term by looking at a range of conjunctions to link clauses and Year 3 will be introduced to commas to separate fronted adverbials from the main sentences, often in Year 3.		
	We will also be working on paragraphing and organising longer pieces of text for story writing. We want the children to be using a variety of word types and punctuation to vary their writing and be able to write for different purposes.

	This project will cover growth in animals by exploring the life cycles of some familiar animals. We will build on learning about the survival of humans by identifying the basic needs of animals for survival, including food, water, air and shelter.

	In this topic, we are going to be learning how edit, crop and filter photographs and how to search safely for images online.	In this topic, we will be learning how to create charts and pictograms on a computer to represent data.

We will learn to discuss, plan and reflect on ideas and strategies. We will also use basic map skills.</li> </ul>

Bushcraft	We have Bushcraft every Thursday. Please ensure that your child has plenty of layers	
French	and appropriate footwear that they can wear. In the summer term, we are going to continue to work on our French fluency. This will include learning how to listen and respond to French phrases, identify key objects in the classroom and ask questions.	
Religious Education	In RE this term, we are going to be exploring why people have different views about God. It will give us the opportunity to explore a range of beliefs including Humanism and Multifaith.	
History	Our history topic this term is 'Magnificent Monarchs'. In the Magnificent Monarchs project, we will learn about English and British monarchs from 871 AD to the present day and consider how the power of the monarchy has changed over time. We will study six significant sovereigns; Alfred the Great, William the Conqueror, Henry VIII, Elizabeth I, Queen Victoria and Elizabeth II. Finally, we will choose which of the sovereigns that we have studied is the most significant.	
PSHE/RSHE	In the summer term we are returning to the PSHE topics as Year 1/2/3 have had all of their RSHE lessons. In PSHE the children will be learning about Fire Safety, being a Global Citizen and Feelings & Emotions.	
Art & Design	Art and Design:	Design Technology:
Design Technology	<b>Portraits and Poses</b> – In this project we will analyse the portraits of Tudor monarchs and compare Tudor portraits and selfies today. We will use photo editing software to create royal portraits.	Cut, Stitch and Join - We will be learning about fabric products and the brand Cath Kidston. They learn about sewing patterns and using a running stitch and embellishments before making a sewn bag tag. Push and Pull - We will be learning about three types of mechanism: sliders, levers and linkages. We will then be designing and making a greetings card with a moving part.
Music	In music we have two main topics called 'The Friendship Song' and 'Reflect, Rewind and Replay'. These songs will introduce the children to a range of musical genres, from Classical all the way to Contemporary music. We will be using the skills we have learned this year to compose our own music and come up with improvisations.
